Social accountability for a non-profit organization is the impact that organization has on its wider community. It is a measure of an organization's commitment to its mission, stakeholders and the greater community.

Each of the LifeSpire of Virginia communities along with the Virginia Baptist Homes Foundation are significantly impacting their localities. As part of our vision of vibrant living where faith, wellness and community flourish, that community extends around each residence.

In 2024 the LifeSpire family, including the VBH Foundation, AgeSmart and five communities, provided more than \$1.4 million in monetary donations, goods and services to public charities and organizations.

Across all of LifeSpire, team members gave over 418 hours and residents and members gave over 18,728 hours of time to volunteer service.

2024 Giving Highlights - Greater Community Engagement & Support

The Virginia Baptist Home Foundation donated:
